VISION

SOJOURN builds inclusive communities inspired by Jewish and universal values.

CORE VALUES

GSD Empowerment We work to empower GSD people and allies to spread SOJOURN's messages of inclusion and implement them in all areas of their lives and in other communities. We aim to remove stumbling blocks placed in front of GSD people, whether legal, spiritual, or communal.

Judaism We undertake our mission through a Jewish lens, using its values and ethics to guide us in our work. We are inspired by its ideals and the teaching that every person is created b'tzelem Elohim, in the image of God.

Affirmation We work toward full GSD affirmation, inclusion, and acceptance – not just tolerance – of GSD people in our communities. GSD people play vital and necessary roles, and we both value and celebrate their contributions.

Understanding We work toward full understanding of gender and sexual diversity. We aim to teach who people are rather than what people are. We break down labels and barriers and build relationships.

Justice Our responsibility to our communities does not stop at our own needs. As Jews, we understand that we, too, were once strangers in a strange land, and we are called to advocate toward full legal equality for all.

Life-Long Learning We value and understand the role education has in our daily lives and the safety it can create. Learning calls us to be active listeners, open-minded, and better prepared to enter our world as we hold and facilitate challenging conversations.

Sacredness of Life Judaism teaches that every life is sacred, and if a person saves one life, it is as if they have saved the whole world. We dedicate ourselves to suicide prevention in children, teens, and adults. Our hope is that people may be able to not just endure life but savor it.

Universality We undertake our mission through a universal lens as well, recognizing that many of our core values resonate in many traditions. We seek to build bridges and connect each other through compassion and liberation.

Partnership We recognize that we can only achieve our goals through partnership with local, regional, and national organizations and communities. We enthusiastically partner with any agency of any or no faith that already affirms – or wishes to undertake the process of affirming – GSD people.

SOJOURN'S PROGRAMS: COMMUNITY IMPACT

SOJOURN's mission is to affirm and empower gender & sexually diverse (GSD) people across the south by building inclusive communities, inspired by Jewish and universal values. We do this in four ways: **Education, Advocacy, Outreach, and Support**.

The South has, in many ways, a distinct culture, and it requires a unique method of interaction and education. With that in mind, since its inception as an independent organization in 2013, SOJOURN has reached 20,000+ people through our programming.

Education

Our workshops focus on giving students, parents, teachers, clergy, and communities the tools to be welcoming for gender and sexually diverse people, Judaic learning, and suicide prevention.

Legislatures in many southern states have debated multiple anti-LGBT (Religious "Freedom") bills in the last six years. Thanks in part to SOJOURN's coordination efforts, Atlanta's Jewish community has been a potent voice in conversations about discrimination, and not a single local rabbi has spoken in support of the religious liberty bills.

WHAT TO DO WHEN SOMEONE COMES OUT TO YOU

DO... Listen to what they have to say and let them set the tone of the conversation. Listening will show that you respect them and help put them at ease. Be serious or casual depending on whether they're serious or casual. However, if they seem upset, go ahead and comfort them. Don't underestimate the power of encouraging words or a hug (if it's appropriate for your relationship).

DON'T... Rush them or "fill in the blanks." Let your acquaintance take as much time as they need. If you hurry them to get to the point, or interrupt before they're finished and say "so you're LGBTQ, in other words," you may trivialize the situation and make them feel uncomfortable or self-conscious.

DO... Ask appropriate questions. Think about your relationship with this person before they came out. How close are you? How many personal details have you shared in the past? Use discretion. Questions that are appropriate for your best friend or your brother might cross a line with a new acquaintance or a coworker.

DON'T... Ask about the person's sex life ("are you a top or a bottom?") or STI/HIV status. It's rude and condescending. By coming out, your acquaintance is seeking acceptance as an LGBTQ person, not as a walking sexual fetish. Even if you're very close and you've both discussed sex or health issues in the past, don't bring them up during the coming out conversation.

DO... Be honest when you don't understand. Just remember to be polite and respectful. You don't have to understand/agree/condone being out in order to be a good person.

DON'T... Use slang terms or offensive language. However, every person is different and a term embraced by one person might be offensive to someone else. When in doubt, ask how they prefer to identify — or better yet, just call them by their name.

DO... Remember the difference between sexual orientation and gender identity. Sexual orientation is about the kind of people you're attracted to. Gender identity is about how you relate to your ascribed gender role and your body. Don't confuse being lesbian, gay or bisexual with being transgender. Gay men don't want to be women and lesbians don't want to be men. Similarly, if someone comes out as trans, don't tell them they're "just gay" or "actually a lesbian."

DON'T... Answer "I'm LGBTQ" with "Well, duh!" Even if you've always suspected this person was LGBTQ, it can be impolite or even offensive to point this out. Your acquaintance may feel ashamed that it's taken them so long to come out and they don't need to be reminded of that struggle. If they ask if you've suspected they were LGBTQ, answer honestly but respectfully.

DO... Ask about confidentiality and reassure them of your confidence. Are they telling everyone or just you? While some people come out to everyone, all at once, others come out in gradual stages. If this person isn't "going public," make sure they know they can trust you to keep the information to yourself until they're ready for others to know.

DON'T... Take it personally, or assume this means that he or she has a crush on you. Coming out can be very daunting. No closeted LGBTQ person ever intends to betray or deceive someone they care about. There are many reasons why someone would wait to come out. Don't jump to the conclusion that they've been harboring secret feelings for you. It could make you defensive and they might feel uncomfortable or self-conscious as a result.

DO... Thank them for trusting you. There's a reason this person is confiding in you. They respect you, feel comfortable with you and value your relationship. He or she may also wish to form a stronger connection by sharing something so personal.

DON'T... Bring up politics or religion, offer unsolicited advice or make rash decisions. It's disrespectful. This person isn't coming out to you because they want to have a debate. Don't suggest that they "might be confused" or needs counseling. If you disagree over LGBTQ issues, there will be other opportunities to have a polite discussion. Try to keep an open mind.

DO... Treat them the same. They are still the same person. Unless they tell you otherwise, your LGBTQ acquaintance's interests and hobbies won't completely change now that they are out of the closet. Your sports buddy won't suddenly ditch the NBA Playoffs to listen to Lady Gaga. Assure your family member, friend or coworker that nothing changes between you two. This is one of the best ways to be a straight ally.

TERMINOLOGY + DEFINITIONS

Agender A person without a gender.

Ally A person who supports a community with which they do not identify/of which they are not a member. (By definition, allies are NOT part of the community they are supporting.)

Aromantic ("arrow") A person who experiences no romantic attraction (or limited attraction) to any people.

Asexual ("ace") Asexual ("ace") A person who experiences no sexual attraction (or limited attraction) to any people.

Biological/Chromosomal Sex An outdated term used to describe the "sex assigned at birth" of transgender people, often with an inference that, while one's gender expression or identity may change, deep down, they are still a man/woman. This is damaging and should be avoided, as science has shown multiple biological/chromosomal variations in existence.

Bi-Erasure/Biphobia The (incorrect) assumption that bisexuality does not exist.

Bisexual A person who has the ability to have sexual relationships with people of the same gender and/or a different gender. (Related: Biromantic)

Cisgender A person whose sex assigned at birth matches their gender. (Latin prefix "cis" = "on the same side as".)

Cissexism/Cisnormativity The assumption or belief that everyone is or should be cisgender (non-transgender).

Coming Out The never-ending process of revealing one's sexual orientation or gender, whether to oneself or to others.

GSD SOJOURN's preferred acronym (instead of LGBT+) means "gender and sexual diversity.

Genderqueer/Genderfluid A person whose gender is non-binary; is beyond genders; is multiple genders; or some combination thereof.

Gender Binary The (incorrect) assumption that there are only two genders, male and female.

Gender Expression The outward manifestation of one's gender, including clothing, makeup, and other style choices.

Gender Identity (1)A person's internal view or interpretation of their gender; (2) A sometimes micro-aggression against transgender people (cis people are said to have a gender while trans people have a gender identity).

Gender Non-Conforming/Gender Variant/Gender Expansive A person who does not participate in the cultural expectations for gender expression as dictated by society.

Heterosexism/Heteronormativity The assumption or belief that everyone is or should be heterosexual.

Internalized Homo/Trans/biphobia/Internalized Oppression Fear or self-hate of one's own (GSD) identity; often occurs in those who grew up hearing negative messages about GSD (or their specific group of) people.

Intersectionality The understanding that certain cultural oppressions are bound together and influenced by the various systems of society, including race, gender, orientation, and others.

Intersex A person who is born with discordant external or internal biological sex characteristics or chromosomes. (Formerly: Hermaphrodite, now considered to be offensive/inappropriate)

Misogyny The hatred of women. (related: transmisogyny)

Pansexual A person who has the ability to have sexual relationships/attraction to people of all genders. (Related: Panromantic)

Polyamory The practice or desire of having more than one intimate relationship at a time, with the consent and knowledge of everyone involved.

Privilege Unearned resources and advantages available to some based solely on social, racial, or other group membership.

Queer Anyone who chooses to identify as such. A blanket term for any, all, or none of the alphabet letters (LGBT...). Considered by some to be offensive and by others to be a term that has been "reclaimed."

Romantic Orientation The innate romantic or emotional attraction one has to others, often labeled based on the gender relationship between a person and the person to whom they are attracted.

Same Gender Loving/In the Life A self-identification term often used by POC (people of color) as protest against the typically white-associated terms "gay" and "lesbian."

Sex Assigned at Birth The conflation of sex + gender assigned to a person at birth by their doctor, based on assumptions made by the presence of certain external/visible genitalia. "AFAB/AMAB" = "Assigned Female/Male at Birth" ("Biological sex" is often misused here and is inappropriate.)

Sexual Orientation The innate sexual attraction one has to others, often labeled based on the gender relationship between a person and the person to whom they are attracted.

Sexual Preference Often misused for "sexual orientation;" the types of sexual encounters and activities one prefers.

Transgender A person whose sex assigned at birth does not match their gender. (Latin prefix "trans" = across)
