Our commitment runs deep: our dedicated LGBTQ Inclusion Taskforce works continuously to ensure our synagogue remains a space where every person can worship, learn, and grow authentically. Year after year, we've proudly participated in Pride Shabbat services and marched together at Pride festivals, proclaiming that love is love, and that our tradition embraces the beautiful diversity of God's creation. We've opened our sacred sanctuary to host the AIDS Memorial Quilt, honoring the memory of those we've lost while fostering healing within our community. Through advocacy programs, educational initiatives, and moments of collective mourning and hope, we've confronted the injustices faced by the gay community during the AIDS epidemic—because justice and compassion are core Jewish values we live by. Additionally, we participated in a strategic planning congregational evaluation brought to us through a SOJOURN-Keshet collaboration, working with our lay-leadership to identify and illuminate blind spots in our inclusion efforts. AA's lay leadership proudly includes members of the LGBTQ community, including synagogue board members and past president, reflecting our commitment to diversity and inclusion.

Facilities Our sanctuary is equipped with a hearing loop allowing people to connect their hearing aid devices directly into our sound system OR use one of our listening headphone devices available at the entrance. We have ramps allowing wheelchair accessibility and a central podium with adjustable height allowing for adjustment for wheelchair use. We also have an automated door. We have several genderneutral/single-stall restrooms located with our main floor restrooms.

About The Atlanta Jewish Film Festival (AJFF) is the largest Jewish film festival in the Southeast and one of the largest in the world, offering a cinematic exploration of the Jewish experience. Seeking to build bridges of understanding through film, AJFF presents a broad range of narrative and documentary works that reflect Jewish and Israeli identity, history, and culture, as well as universal themes that connect us across diverse communities. Through our flagship annual festival and an expanding slate of year-round programming, AJFF inspires audiences to new levels of cultural curiosity and social understanding. Inclusivity is central to our mission — members of the LGBTQ+ community, ethnic or national minorities, and people of all faiths and backgrounds will always have a place at AJFF.

LGBTQ-Specific Services and Info Among our diverse array of films are titles that explore experiences within the LGBTQ+ community through a Jewish lens. These works foster dialogue, inspire conversation, and build understanding both during the festival and through year-round events, including community screenings, filmmaker Q&As, and educational initiatives.

Programs and Services The 26th Annual Atlanta Jewish Film Festival will take place February 18 – March 3, 2026 in theaters at Cobb Energy Performing Arts Center and other iconic metro-Atlanta venues, followed by an unlimited 10-day streaming window March 6–15, 2026. The festival showcases approximately 70–80 international and independent films, challenging audiences to see the world through new perspectives. Year-round programs include educational partnerships, a new Filmmaker Fund supporting Jewish storytellers, and community events that use film to promote thoughtful, meaningful conversations.

Volunteer opportunities are available throughout the year in areas such as event hospitality, marketing, community outreach, and program support — from the flagship annual festival to special events like the AJFF Gala Concert, educational screenings, and Kenny Blank Vision Initiative programs. JScreen also offers a separate Hereditary Cancer Test that provides information about cancer risk and enables prevention, early detection and treatment. Gender Identity - an identity based on one's relationship to femininity and masculinity, especially as it relates to society and culture.

Gender Expression - how one externally presents one's gender identity through behavior, clothing, haircut or voice, and which may or may not conform to socially defined behaviors and characteristics typically associated with being either masculine or feminine.

Biological Sex - A label given at birth based on medical factors, including hormones, chromosomes, and genitals.

Assigned Gender At Birth - sometimes abbreviated to AGAB, this refers to the gender identity assumed for someone at a young age, usually based on their hormones, chromosomes, and genitals at birth. Assigned Female at Birth (AFAB and Assigned Male at Birth (AMAB) are the specific designations based on above.

Non-binary - a term someone might use to indicate that they don't fit into the gender categories of "male" or "female".

Transgender - anyone who doesn't identify with their assigned gender at birth.

Cisgender - anyone who identifies with their assigned gender at birth.

Intersex - someone born with reproductive or sexual anatomy that is typically not exclusively "male" or "female" (i.e. XXY Chromosomes).

Pronouns - a way to refer to someone without using their name. Historically these have been gendered, i.e. she/her or he/him. However, gender-neutral pronouns can include singular they/them, xe/xem, ze/hir, and more.

Sexual orientation - an identity based on the people someone is sexually and/or romantically attracted to.

dossity of LGBTQ+ Terms, contd

Asexual - someone who experiences no sexual attraction to anyone (though they could still be romantically attracted to people).

Aromantic - someone who experiences no romantic attraction to anyone (though they still could be sexually attracted to people).

Gay - usually refers to men who are attracted to other men; is also used as an umbrella term for diverse sexualities.

Lesbian - women who are attracted to women. This may include nonbinary or transmasculine people that identify as part of the lesbian community.

Bisexual - someone attracted to their own gender and other genders.

Pansexual - someone who is attracted to people regardless of gender.

Queer - historically used as a slur, this term has been reclaimed as a broad umbrella term to describe sexual and gender identities other than straight and/or cisgender. Queer is sometimes used to express that sexuality and gender can be complicated, change over time, and might not fit neatly into either/or identities.

Heterosexual or Straight - a cisgender person who is attracted exclusively to other cisgender people whose gender is different from their own.

This list of terms shows the variety of language that people can use to describe themselves; which is often evolving, therefore this list is far from complete. Terms exist so that people can reach for language that feels applicable, feel proud, and find community with others who identify the same way. The purpose is NOT to establish rigid categories that people feel excluded from or pressured to fit into. When someone says how they identify, that's how they see themselves. It's everyone's job to take that identity seriously and with respect.
